Books On Wheels Visit Local Neighborhoods



The Book Trunk mobile delivers books to eager readers

The Book Trunk mobile has officially hit the road this summer, and so far everything is "rolling" smoothly. On Thursday, June 8th, the Book Trunk made its first trip, visiting the Linwood, Ridgecrest, Versailles, and Norwood neighborhoods. Volunteers handed out over 150 books to approximately 60 children! Since then the Book Trunk has visited the RISE program at Fair Street International Academy, Melrose Apartments, Lenox Park and The Fields of McEver neighborhood. Over the next few weeks, the Boys and Girls Club will be added to the route.

The Book Trunk offers reading resources to GCSS students to enhance their reading skills over the summer, especially for those students who are unable to visit the local library or bookstore. This opportunity is made possible by dedicated volunteers who donate their time to deliver books to our students.

"Volunteering on the Book Trunk offers us the opportunity to reach out to our community to create positive relationships while encouraging our children to read outside the classroom," shared Book Trunk Coordinator Cara Mulkey. "As educators we all know how important it is for children to be exposed to books and to read

outside of the classroom, but study after study shows that children in our lower income neighborhoods are not very likely to have access to books outside of school. This can unfortunately lead to gaps in achievement that get wider and wider over the summer."

Ms. Mulkey states that the Book Trunk volunteers offer more to these students than just books. She explains, "Not only do we give out books, but we also give out smiles! Students of all ages light up when they see their teachers in their neighborhoods. Even older students that want to pretend that they are too old for our brightly colored bus love to see their former teachers that touched their lives."

Migrant Summer School has been in full swing during the month of June. Students participated in a variety of learning activities and met with visitors and special guests from our community. In each classroom, students were engaged in hands-on small group activities which enriched their listening, reading, and writing vocabulary. Students also participated in math activities that included the use of technology such as Smart Board and computers to challenge their minds. Each day the GCSS lunchroom staff provided two healthy meals, allowing students to be well nourished and productive for their busy day.

Sarah Jolly, from the Humane Society, along with her dog Lexi visited the students and shared information about caring for pets, pet adoptions, and how our local Humane Society serves the community.

Gainesville firefighters from Fire Station #1 came out to teach fire safety and demonstrated how they use their equipment. As a special souvenir, they provided fire hats for each student.

Migrant students have engaged in fun learning exercises to help decrease the risk of learning loss over the summer. Within a few weeks, the Migrant Summer School program has already made a tremendous impact on students by providing free, invaluable resources that prepare them for the upcoming school year. "Personally, this program has helped migrant children not to stay behind in math and reading while parents work," shared GCSS Migrant Summer School Coordinator Paula Macedo. "I am also glad that the migrant program provides free books during the summer so that children can read at home." By providing these opportunities during the summer, students remain on a continuous path of academic achievement as they prepare to return to school in the fall.

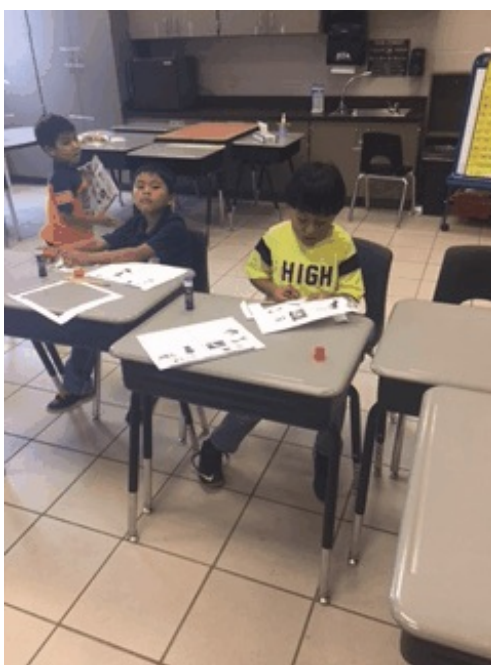

His artwork will be displayed at the annual APH meeting in Louisville, Kentucky in October and will be available for purchase for interested art collectors.

Each year the American Printing House for the Blind invites visually impaired and blind artists of all ages to submit artwork to the APH InSights Art Contest. This art competition and exhibition is exclusively for blind and visually impaired artists and draws entries from across the nation and around the world. Approximately 500 entries are submitted each year, and the winning artworks are featured in the annual APH calendar and displayed on greeting cards.

Summer Safety Tips for Families



June is National Safety Month, and the National Safety Council encourages families to exercise safety precautions during the summer months. Since school is out, families are spending more time at home and/or away from home. Everyone should focus on staying safe by taking extra precautions against common hazards during the summer such as Heat Exposure, Fireworks, Playgrounds, and Outdoor Recreational Activities.

Here are five safety tips to help families enjoy a safe summer:

1. Avoid exposure to extreme temperatures. Stay indoors as much as possible during high temperatures. When outdoors, minimize the amount of time exposed to heat and stay hydrated with fluids. Limit outside activities to early mornings or late afternoons when the temperature has decreased.
2. With the July 4th holiday coming soon, parents should refrain from allowing children to handle fireworks. Due to the risk of burns and injuries, parents should always handle fireworks and should carefully monitor children around fireworks.
3. Children should be monitored when playing on playground equipment (especially small children). Check to make sure that there are no broken, loose, or jagged parts on the equipment. Inform children about proper playground etiquette.
4. Take extra precautions when participating in outdoor recreational activities. An adult should always be present to monitor children during outdoor activities, and appropriate safety gear such as life jackets, helmets, elbow and knee pads should be utilized when participating in outdoor recreational activities such as swimming,

skiing, cycling, and skateboarding,

5. Children and adults should both exercise caution when walking especially along busy streets or intersections. Adults should accompany children when crossing streets and should always utilize the cross walks. Remember to look in both directions of traffic and always make sure that the driver of the vehicle has stopped before crossing the street.

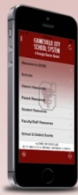

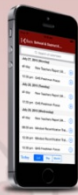


Here are some amazing features to look forward to and things you can do with the GCSS app:
